

# Analysis – in the light of the European Union acquis – of ILO up to date Conventions

- Annex "C183 - Maternity Protection Convention" -



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SUMMARY	
Convention	C183 - Maternity Protection Convention, 2000 (No. 183)
Subject	• Convention No. 183 provides for 14 weeks of maternity benefit to women to whom the instrument applies (Article 4). Women who are absent from work on maternity leave shall be entitled to a cash benefit which ensures that they can maintain themselves and their child in proper conditions of health and with a suitable standard of living and which shall be no less than two-thirds of her previous earnings or a comparable amount (Article 6). The convention also requires ratifying states to take measures to ensure that a pregnant woman or nursing mother is not obliged to perform work which has been determined to be harmful to her health or that of her child, and provides for protection from discrimination based on maternity (Article 8). The standard also prohibits employers to terminate the employment of a woman during pregnancy or absence on maternity leave, or during a period following her return to work, except on grounds unrelated to pregnancy, childbirth and its consequences, or nursing. Women returning to work must be returned to the same position or an equivalent position paid at the same rate (Article 8(2)). Also provides a woman the right to one or more daily breaks or a daily reduction of hours of work to breastfeed her child (Article 10).

In Opinion 2/91 the ECJ states that:

'34. ...even if the competent authority referred to... is an authority of one of the Member States, the Community may nevertheless assume the aforementioned obligation for external purposes. Just as, for internal purposes, the Community may provide, in an area covered by Community rules, that national authorities are to be given certain supervisory powers (see in particular Article 4 of Council Directive 80/1107/EEC of 27 November 1980 on the protection of workers from the risks related to exposure to chemical, physical and biological agents at work, OJ 1980 L 327, p. 8, cited by the Council), it may also, for external purposes,

## EMPLOYMENT PROTECTION AND NONDISCRIMINATION Article 8

1. It shall be unlawful for an employer to terminate the employment of a woman during her pregnancy or absence on leave referred to in Articles 4 or 5 or during a period following her return to work to be prescribed by national laws or regulations, except on grounds unrelated to the pregnancy or birth of the child and its consequences or nursing. The burden of proving that the reasons for dismissal are unrelated to pregnancy or childbirth and its consequences or nursing shall rest on the employer.
